Engaging Perpetrators & Youth in Prevention	<ul> <li>Understanding the motivations and behaviours of TFGBV perpetrators is critical for designing effective interventions.</li> <li>Programs must integrate youth advisory groups to ensure interventions resonate with digital-native generations.</li> <li>Avoid gatekeeping in prevention efforts—young people should be co-creators in policy and research on digital violence.</li> </ul>
Measuring TFGBV More Effectively	<ul> <li>There is a lack of standardised tools to measure TFGBV, leading to underreporting and data gaps.</li> <li>The MADVA scale provides an innovative method to assess adolescent attitudes toward online and offline abuse, helping to shape more effective interventions.</li> <li>More research is needed to track how perpetrators use emerging technologies (e.g., AI, deepfake tools, tracking apps) to commit abuse.</li> </ul>
Deepfake & Al-Generated Gender-Based Violence	<ul> <li>Nonconsensual deepfake pornography disproportionately targets women, creating new challenges in victim protection and legal accountability.</li> <li>Current legal frameworks are inadequate in addressing AI-generated image-based abuse, necessitating updated policies and digital harm reduction strategies.</li> <li>Platforms must be held accountable for hosting and distributing non-consensual deepfake content.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>TFGBV manifests differently across regions, influenced by social norms, legal structures, and cultural barriers to reporting.</li> <li>In some contexts (e.g., India), family expectations may pressure victims to remain silent about digital</li> </ul>

Cultural & Legal Contexts Matter	<ul> <li>abuse.</li> <li>Legislation and enforcement mechanisms must be tailored to local realities while ensuring a universal commitment to digital safety.</li> </ul>
Technology & TFGBV: Platform Responsibility & Data Transparency	<ul> <li>Social media platforms and digital services providers collect vast amounts of data on online harassment, stalking, and nonconsensual content, but fail to share insights with researchers or regulators.</li> <li>Transparency reports and platform accountability measures are essential for addressing the scale of digital gender-based violence.</li> <li>Governments and international bodies must push for stronger platform regulations and proactive content moderation policies.</li> </ul>
Longitudinal Research & The Evolving Nature of TFGBV	<ul> <li>Digital abuse tactics are evolving rapidly, meaning static studies quickly become outdated.</li> <li>Longitudinal research is needed to track how perpetrators adapt to new technologies and how victims experience harm over time.</li> <li>Collaboration between researchers, tech companies, and policymakers is essential to keep prevention strategies effective.</li> </ul>
