

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introduction

Eighteen months ago, I put out a simple call on social media, wondering if anyone else felt the same loneliness I did and wanted a community in this field. I never could have imagined that today we would be a network of nearly 400 members, representing over 50 countries, with more than 60% of us from low- and middle-income regions. Working in gender-based violence is profoundly challenging and often isolating. The weight of this work is heavy, and it's easy to find oneself grappling with poor mental health without always knowing where to turn. For many of us, the need for support runs deep, yet the path to finding it can feel unclear, or even out of reach. At times, I've felt the despair of not knowing where or how to seek the understanding and empathy needed to continue.

This community has become a lifeline. At SVRI, we gathered for eight events that weren't just about professional growth but about human connection and shared resilience. From informal coffee chats, lunches, and dinners to sunsets on the promenade and powerful round-table discussions, we created space for real conversations. One of the most meaningful events was our Early Career Researchers and Research Giants meet-up, where early- and mid-career researchers could connect directly with leaders in the field. These gatherings weren't limited to career paths; they encompassed the realities of navigating this space as mothers, as survivors, as young and mid-career researchers, and as newcomers. Mental health and well-being were not sidelined but prioritised, and it became clear that the need for collective care was urgent. We formed new friendships, shared our struggles, and even shed tears — but we also laughed, bonded, and built each other up.

When I asked myself what I needed a year and a half ago, during one of the darkest periods of my life, I knew I needed community, kindness, guidance, and compassion. I needed understanding from those who truly "get it" and patience from those who know the toll this work can take. This network has been all of that and more. Seeing people connect deeply within days, witnessing friendships and collaborations spark before my eyes — it has made every moment of hardship feel worthwhile.

We can't pour from an empty cup. To make a difference in this field, we must take care of ourselves and each other. This work may be difficult, but with a community to lean on, it is possible. I am filled with hope for the next generation and deep admiration for everyone walking this path alongside me. No one said it would be easy, but now, together, we can believe that it will be worth it.

This was the first time I attended the SVRI Forum and all I can say was it was exhilarating, thought provoking and inclusive. I particularly enjoyed the Forum because I was part of a Early Career Research (ECR) Network that had separate events organized everyday (lunches, meetings with Research Giants, panel discussions and informal dinners). The events were specifically for those who were in their early stage of their life and the spaces offered the opportunity to talk about each others work, provide support based on experience and learn about the challenges across different settings.

In particular, I was especially impressed by the session "ECRs meet Research Giants in the Field" – Being part of this session was surreal. The ECRs interacted in small groups with those who were influencing the field of violence. This opportunity gave ECRs an ability to get to know the research giants and ask questions about challenges, opportunities and addressing work life balance. We laughed, listened and cried with each other on our personal struggles and joys. This session was a brain child of the lead organizers and brought to life by the SVRI leadership who allowed us to come under the umbrella of SVRI.

I also enjoyed the one on one sessions to network, connect and talk about different ideas and intersecting topics to bring collective change to the field. It was because of

these dedicated spaces, I was able to lean for support, pitch ideas and be part of the next generation of researchers and practitioners who want to influence prevention and mitigation of violence across the life course.

Attending my first SVRI Forum was an eye-opening and energising experience, filled with countless opportunities to expand both knowledge and network. The forum felt like a vibrant community where early career researchers (ECRs) were not only welcomed but celebrated. From daily lunches to immersive sessions, every event was thoughtfully crafted to bring ECRs closer to one another and to the broader GBV

research community.

One highlight was the dialogue "Buidling the new generation of evidence builders", where peers shared stories of resilience and perseverance, and I left with a renewed sense of purpose, knowing that these connections would support me throughout my career. The dedicated spaces for ECRs (with the memorable green sign) were more than networking opportunities; they were places to connect on a personal level

and discuss the real-life experiences behind our work. These sessions allowed us to explore topics such as the emotional challenges of fieldwork, the importance of self-care, and the unique hurdles faced by those early in their careers.

Ultimately, the SVRI Forum showed me the power of a supportive network that believes in the potential of emerging voices. I am happy that the creation of our ECRs group has contributed to this. I feel ready to carry this experience forward, knowing that the connections and insights gained here will shape our careers and

OUR PRIORITIES FOR SVRI



01. Well-being

At SVRI 2024, we prioritised well-being by creating spaces for early career researchers to engage in open, supportive discussions about mental health and collective care. A standout session, "Academia and Perfectionism," provided a safe environment to address issues like imposter syndrome, where attendees could share personal struggles, offer mutual support, and foster a sense of community. Additionally, informal gatherings over coffee, lunch, and even during a sunset allowed members to connect as individuals beyond their professional roles, creating moments of camaraderie that underscored the importance of well-being in this field.



02. Networking

The SVRI 2024 Forum offered us invaluable networking opportunities, where members connected with both peers and established experts in the field. Through a series of structured and informal events—including panels, meals, and relaxed evening gatherings—participants had the chance to forge genuine connections and collaborations. A particular highlight was our panel on "Building the Next Generation of Evidence Builders," which enabled early career researchers to discuss their aspirations and the challenges they face. The presence of senior researchers and practitioners provided a bridge across generations, sparking new ideas and collaborative opportunities for the coming year.




03. Mentorship

Our mentorship priority came to life at SVRI 2024, where seasoned researchers—referred to as the "giants" of the field—engaged with early career researchers in both formal panels and informal settings. The SVRI platform enabled meaningful exchanges on career development, research challenges, and life balance, leaving many feeling inspired and supported. By fostering these mentor-mentee relationships, we strengthened our network and honoured the legacy of those who paved the way, helping early career members feel equipped and motivated to lead in the future.

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
